

# Woodbury, Exmouth & Budleigh (WEB) Community Health & Wellbeing Board

## Terms of Reference

### Purpose

The WEB Community Health & Wellbeing Board will enable the communities of the towns and villages of the WEB area to participate in the development of their own health and care services. The Board is made up of key stakeholders representing the whole community who, with their local knowledge, will provide advice and guidance for the development and effectiveness of health and social care services provided for the communities of all ages in the WEB area.

Delivering the aims of:

- Supporting the effective integration of care to improve health outcomes for the communities of the towns and villages of the WEB area.
- Promoting a high quality, cost effective, sustainable integrated health and social care model that includes mental health and is focussed upon the needs of the community.
- Improving both the experience and independence of service users and carers.
- Promoting early intervention through prevention and improved patient education.
- Ensuring robust links with the third sector throughout the WEB area.
- Promoting the development of a robust transport model which will ensure access across the whole community.
- Improved working with younger people to enable access and support for general health, mental health and social care services.
- Engaging with as diverse a cross section of the WEB area population as possible on specific health and social care matters ensuring that these are considered and represented appropriately.

The WEB Community Health & Wellbeing Board will work together with the WEB PPG's Chairs Group, the Budleigh Salterton Community Hospital Health & Wellbeing Hub Advisory Group and other key stakeholders to engage with the local communities to develop and deliver the aims set out above.

### Core principles

- A partnership of equals, enabling collaboration between organisational cultures and to create a new balance between system and organisational interests.
- This partnership will enable new integrated care models to be developed with engagement between health and social care, the voluntary sector together with the inclusion of service users.
- New integrated care models should be based on an assessment of needs using local knowledge, public health joint strategic needs assessment.
